Beautiful Beloveds,

Ah, Advent...the season of waiting and preparing for the coming of Christ. Each and every year, I tell myself, "This will be the year I prepare early so I can truly savor the season." Some years, I do better. Some years, I do worse. Sometimes the task list becomes a snowball of stress, building as I barrel through December like a formula one racer, days and events blurring by. Those closest to me, pay the price, as I cross the Christmas finish-line half-present, exhausted, empty and cranky. I want to do Advent differently. I don't want to miss a moment of joy, hope, peace and love. I want to savor the season.

Thankfully, Advent is the start of a new year in the life of the church. Each and every year, Advent offers an invitation to start fresh, begin again, and finally learn how to slow down and truly be present. What if our church had one shared New Year's Resolution this Advent? Let's give ourselves, our families, our faith community, "The Gift of Being Present."

Meals in the Park

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The Franklin Farm Community Garden and the Historic Metcalf-Franklin Farm Preservation Association

The volunteers at Franklin Farm have completed the 2023 harvest season! The gardening areas are sleeping for the upcoming cold season and the Winter Rye has germinated to prevent erosion and enrich the soil when it is plowed in in the Spring. Habitat for Humanity

The current project is to erect two duplexes at 83 & 85 Oakland School Street in Burrillville, RI. The second duplex foundation requires a final installation and in the next few weeks volunteer groups hopefully can be assigned the various construction tasks. We will notify AMUMC volunteers when we can return to the work site as we have done previously.

Cintas Clothing Donation and the St. James Episcopal Church Clothing Closet

The twice monthly clothing donations continue from the Cintas Warehouse in Woonsocket to the St. James Church clothing closet. The delivery schedule is posted in the coat room. Those items can be placed in the hallway at our church and they will be delivered to St. James Church by our volunteers.

Dave's Marketplace Day Old Bakery Donations

Since 2016, volunteers from AMUMC have transported day old baked goods three times each week to the Cumberland Senior Center, the Northern RI Food Pantry or the Woonsocket Shelter. The schedule of the three donations each week and the many volunteers making the deliveries is posted on the bulletin board in the coat room.

The Woonsocket Shelter

The Woonsocket Shelter has received donations of persons care items and household items (sheets, towels, guilts, curtains, etc.) for families to relocate into independent living when they leave the shelter. In addition, AMUMC volunteers have been donating day old baked goods from area supermarkets – currently Dave's Marketplace – for over 15 years to the shelter. On Fridays, Elton and Rachel Odom make the weekly deliveries to the Shelter.

The Adopt-A-Family Gifts

The Adopt-A-Family Christmas gifts were delivered on Sunday, November 26th and will be forwarded to their families in the beginning of December for distribution to the families. Thank you AMUMC members again for your generous donations to those families during the holiday season.

Happy Basket Donations

The annual holiday gift giving was a wonderful success again for the HAPPY Basket Program. We raised over \$900 for the volunteers to purchase Christmas gifts for Cumberland children and we will be collecting boxed and canned goods in the beginning of December for distribution to those needy families. Our collective generosity confirms our reputation as the "Amazing" Arnold Mills United Methodist Church.

CLIMATE CARE - SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAICS / HEAT PUMP COMMITTEE

Thank you to everyone who responded to our online survey or provided input at listening sessions during coffee hour. There appears to be strong support for all of the climate care measures being considered, and fairly consistent rankings for prioritizing measures. The team will be meeting the week of December 10th to make final selections and begin obtaining quotes as we work toward approval from the Trustees and the Church Council. Since the currently available funds are not sufficient to complete all the measures desired, we will combine a prioritization process with fundraising to proceed with what measures are attainable in 2024. While we haven't formally kicked off our fundraising, end-of-year contributions for climate care projects are encouraged. Please send any such contributions to the church and designate the funds for "climate care measures". 2023 Trustees Wrap-up

As 2023 comes to a close, the care that your trustees have shown to Arnold Mills UMC's buildings and property was highlighted at our Annual Conference. In case you missed it, here's a recap!

- We received \$1100 in memorial gifts in 2023.
- Donations totaling \$16,986.31 were received which are dedicated to our Sustainability Project.
- Our major project was the repaving of the small parking lot and area in front of the church. The driveway and large parking lot were seal coated and striped.
- New Handicapped Parking signs and posts have been ordered and will be installed soon.
- The roadside sign was cleaned and repainted.
- Stage One of having our organ restored was completed, but unfortunately led to complications still to be resolved.
- As part of complying to Safe Sanctuary requirements, glass windows were installed in the four office doors.
- A lavatory handle/lock was replaced.
- We met with representatives of the Cumberland Police Department to review security concerns.
- In order to prepare for a Fire Department Inspection, we were advised by the chief that we had multiple deficiencies. So... we cleared all the hallways and stairway exits, cleaned out the basement and closets wherever circuit breaker boxes are located, labeled all the fire extinguishers, replaced batteries in security lights, disabled an incorrect exit light, installed two required exit lights in the sanctuary, stopped using electrical extension cords where dangerous, and had GFI outlets installed for the downstairs dehumidifier and on the stage.
- The elevator was inspected and will be serviced in December.
- Our first Carbon Footprint Fair was held.
- Energy audits by RISE were completed on both the church and the parsonage.
- Habitat for Humanity now rents office space from us.
- Cargill Hall was rented for two family reunions and a Diwali Festival.
- The parsonage projects included a chimney inspection, the replacement of exterior lights, electrical upgrades, new shower/bath fixtures, and repairs to the deck stairs.

So, as you can see, we are constantly striving to keep our place of worship welcoming, functional, and safe for everyone.

Tips for December 2023 Greening Your Decorating

Christmas lights are symbols of the Light that came into the world with the birth of Christ. Enjoy them and **use LEDs wherever you can** to take care of the world that Jesus lit up with his presence. You can also give a package or two of the lights to someone you love to help them love creation.

Go live! Live trees that you can replant are kindest to the environment. A cut tree harvested from an organic tree farm will likely be replaced with two others that will also combat climate change. If you need a smaller tree, consider a potted tree you can enjoy year-round (with or without the decorations). Whatever size you need, check local nurseries. Some are beginning to rent out trees for the holidays.

If you are considering an artificial tree, **count the costs to the environment** before you buy. Artificial trees are made from a plastic called PVC, which creates <u>hazardous waste</u> and emissions during manufacturing. Most are shipped from China, which increases their carbon footprint much more than real trees. **If you already own an artificial tree**, use it for at least 10 years. Keep the tree in good condition so that you can pass it on to someone else who will appreciate having it and won't need to buy one.

Ask parents or grandparents to give you an ornament that has been a part of your growing-up Christmas traditions. Pass along its story to your children. Or make your own tree ornaments representing something meaningful to you. Glue family photos to card stock and hang the picture on the tree. Create some new stories to tell each Christmas.

Create less waste by how you wrap your gifts. One of the savviest zero-waste decisions is to save wrapping paper, tissue paper, bows, and ribbons to reuse each year. Or adorn your gift with fabric like a scarf (new or vintage) that can be worn. Look also for old maps, sheet music, newspaper funnies, or plain paper painted with your children's handprints and art.

While it might be fun to rip and tear into a wrapped present, the fancy paper itself is most likely to be laminated with plastic, foil, glitter, or other non-paper materials that contaminate a recycle bin. The short fibers in tissue paper make it unrecyclable too. Rather than wrapping paper, **go for reusable gift bags**.

Go retro. **String popcorn and cranberries** on cotton thread. After Christmas, put the strings outside for the birds to munch on or decompose in the soil. However, don't give in to the temptation to go back to tinsel or fake "snow" — they never decay.

Rather than buying new decorations, **turn to thrift shops and garage sales** to find one-of-a-kind used ornaments and holiday decor.


If you do buy new decorations, **keep justice in the forefront**. Make sure the items are Fair Trade, which means the workers who made them earned a living wage and didn't labor under sweatshop conditions. <u>Ten Thousand Villages</u> and <u>SERRV International</u> both sell Fair Trade holiday decor.

Invite children to make decorations. Spend time together and show them how to cut snowflakes from recycled paper. Or help them create a collage or ornaments by using greeting cards from a previous year. Or search nature for boughs of holly, evergreens, pinecones, mistletoe to decorate with. (Be mindful of allergies.) Encourage them to find delight in nature and their own creativity in reusing rather than trashing. The learning will carry on past the holidays.


To register go to the Children & Youth page under Education on the church website (amumc.org). You will find a form you can print and fill in and an online form if you prefer registering online. Use either one to register.
