Trustee Report

The Board of Trustees did not meet in January but will be meeting on Thursday, February 8, 2024. First on the agenda will be the annual review of our investments which are managed by Rockland Trust. This meeting will commence at 6:30 PM and all interested members of the congregation are welcome to attend.

During the months of December and January, the trustees were not on vacation.

The following projects and needs have been, or are being, addressed:

- The giant pine tree which crashed in the front yard of the parsonage has been removed, along with a destroyed dogwood. The maple tree along the driveway was trimmed, and recently, all the stumps were ground down. Our thanks go to Fran Carr for handling all this with Stanley Tree Service.
- Due to this tree taking down wires and the electrical control panel becoming wet, a new panel was installed in the parsonage by Eastland Electric.
- After the heavy rainstorms in January, the sump pump in the parsonage basement decided that it had had enough! Thanks to the joint efforts of Sam Baker and George Gettinger, a new pump has been installed. More shelving was purchased by the trustees in order to get stored items off the ground, as well as a dry/wet shop vac to be used at both the church and parsonage.
- Dave Larson and the Sustainability Committee received approval from the trustees to take the RISE proposal for energy improvements to the Church Council to be voted upon. This first step, which was approved, involves adding insulation and updating the lighting in both the sanctuary and the hall. Adding solar panels will be researched and discussed further.
- We are grateful this month for the men who diligently take care of our parking lots and walkways; our friend, Peter Bradley, and from Orchard Acres, Jon Ryone. Also Marques Cleaning Service is to be commended for their hard work. The church and hall are cleaned every other Friday afternoon and always look clean and neat afterwards!

A note from the Reconciliation Team.....

As mentioned, the church council at Arnold Mills United Methodist Church voted to start the reconciliation process. What does this mean exactly? The Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) focuses on the full participation of all LGBTQ+ people throughout the life and leadership of the Church. The vision is a transformed United Methodist Church that ensures justice, equity, and dignity for ALL of God's children in their diverse intersecting identities. A "Reconciling Congregation" publicly proclaims sharing this vision. The reconciliation process allows careful discernment of the church members throughout a process that includes Bible studies, story sharing, open discussion, written information, and more. The process ends with a vote in June by church members to decide IF we will formally be a Reconciling Church. We need 75% of the church body to vote affirmatively to proceed.

FAQ's......

Aren't we already a welcoming church? Yes, we certainly are but one must enter our church to find this out. Our goal is to advertise how welcoming we are to all who drive by or look us up on the internet.

Why is this so important? In 1972, the policy-setting General Conference for the first time added a provision on homosexuality to the Book of Discipline, the church's rule book. The provision said, "The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching." In 1984, the General Conference banned having any "self-avowed practicing homosexuals" as clergy. In 1996, language was approved that prohibits churches and ministers from conducting "ceremonies that celebrate homosexual unions."

During the 2012 General Conference, two prominent pastors made a proposal to add to the Book of Discipline a statement expressing sadness that United Methodists disagree on whether "same-sex sexual intimacy is contrary to the will of God" but vowing "to disagree with respect and love." It was rejected, 54 percent to 46 percent.

While many younger Americans oppose the church's current official position, the average age of United Methodists in this country is 58 and membership is declining. The fast-growing conferences are overseas, particularly in Africa, many of whose pastors strongly have argued at recent General Conference meetings for retention of current policy.

How will this change our weekly sermons? No changes are expected. Pastors will continue to decide what to preach about. Most of our liturgy already uses inclusive language.

Will we be known as the Gay Church? Unlikely, there are other churches in RI who are reconciling including 2 in Providence

If we do affiliate, does that mean our congregation's main focus will be on inclusion and gay rights? No. We support all sorts of justice at AMUMC and this just will be another.

Tips for February 2024

Jesus said the first of the Greatest Commandments (Luke 10:25-28) is to **love God.** How? We love the Creator by loving Creation, by caring for what God has blessed us with as stewards. Look at nature, all that surrounds us, as a gift to be cherished. **Give thanks and follow through with actions** that show your love of God.

Jesus said the Second of the Greatest Commandments is to **love our neighbor**. He then told the story of the Good Samaritan, who cared for an injured traveler (Luke 10:25-37). Our neighbors near and far suffer from environmental injustice. Work to fix the "road" — the systems that perpetuate harm to those with few resources. **Join or support organizations that love** *your* **neighbor** by working for creation justice.

Jesus said as part of the Greatest Commandment that we are to love our neighbor as we **love ourselves** (Luke 10:25-28). We love ourselves by taking care of ourselves for the long haul. **Live a** <u>sustainable lifestyle</u>. Living sustainably makes the world better for ourselves and everyone else.

Jesus said we are to **love our enemies** (Matthew 5:43-45). He followed that statement with "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Luke 6:27-37). Recognize the differences in tactics of hate versus strategies of accountability and reconciliation. **Speak up for change. Show a better way.**

Jesus said to his disciples (and us), "I give you a New Commandment: **Love one another**—and in doing so, you will help others see my love" (paraphrase of John 13:31-35). As a church, work together to **provide opportunities to help the environment** and to give the wider community a vision of what love in action can do. Consider hosting a recycling bin or event.

Love the earth. Stop using <u>Styrofoam</u>. This single-use "convenience" has its raw materials extracted from the earth, leaches harmful chemicals into hot food or drink, adds to the volume of methane from landfills, and exposes production workers to permanent nervous system damage. **Switch to reusable containers** for food and drink.

Love the air. Clean it up. Deadly air pollution contributes to nearly 7 million <u>deaths each year through noncommunicable diseases</u>, including stroke, heart disease, asthma, respiratory infections, and lung cancer. US emissions are among the highest. Women, children, minorities, migrants and displaced persons, older people, and those with underlying conditions bear the brunt. **Reduce your own emissions; pressure your lawmakers** to make changes.

Love the water. Oceans are God's great carbon sinks. With a warming climate our oceans, which work for humanity as well as for an amazing array of marine life, are struggling. <u>Plastic pollution</u> is a major culprit. Litter finds its way through waterways to the great seas. Raise the alarm and an army of friends to **tackle plastic pollution locally and internationally**. That will help downstream too.

Love God's creatures. Consider the endangered <u>forest elephants</u>. In the rainforests of central and west Africa, the elephants prefer to eat the fast growing, low carbon density trees — the weeds of the forest. Thinning those allows the high carbon density trees to flourish, which sequesters more carbon and is better for all God's creatures. Because they eat fruit, they are also planters of new trees. <u>Support elephant conservation</u>.

Love the younger generations. Eco-anxiety is growing among younger people. An antidote to the threat of that mental illness is connecting with people who are taking action. When working for creation care and justice, include younger ones in the efforts and the conversation. Keep in mind, "**He who plants a tree plants a hope**" (Lucy Larcom).

The United Methodist Creation Justice Movement is providing these Tips as a tool to equip church members, families, and individuals to respond to God's call to care for creation and do justice with our neighbors. For more about the UM Creation Justice Movement, go to umcreationjustice.org.

Main Idea: Jesus teaches us to love God and to love others. One way we show love to God and to others is by being respectful.


Objectives: Children will hear what the Bible says about respect and how to treat God, other people, and nature as they explore these concepts:
