Maybe a new spiritual practice you've picked up, a weighty worry or habit you've given up, scenes from "Up," that leave you choked up, or waiting to find out what new song Joey and our choir comes up with to help us all soar to the heavens. Our Solar and Heat Pump Committee is exploring how our church can increase our stewardship of God's resources by putting up solar panels. Our mission committee is up to good here, there, and everywhere with a variety of projects building up our community. Our Church School is learning more about how our love of God and neighbor are bound up in each other. Our Sunday morning hospitality team is continually working to lift our welcome, so that all who walk through our doors are caught up in our radical hospitality. Our safety and security team has almost wrapped up their work and training on our new protocols is up and coming. A message from Dave Larson and the Social Justice Team

Hey Arnold Mills - Shake off those winter/Lenten blues and get active for Social Justice. Do you ever see a news item, or a social media post, and think *"that just isn't fair!"* or *"I wish things were different!"*? Well, it probably isn't fair, and things can be different. As we strive to follow Jesus and do all the good we can in every way and place possible - getting active in social justice is a way to make change happen and improve your outlook. Find that issue or cause that you feel passionate about, and take the first step. **The Social Justice Team will have a table at coffee hour on March 10th** to get you started. Come and find out who your legislators are, what the RI State legislature is working on this year, and how you can make your voice heard. You can contact elected leaders about issues such as:

- providing free school meals for RI children
- providing easier access to mental health and substance abuse services
- lowering utility costs for low income households
- reducing gun violence
- providing bail reform
- regulating the use of solitary confinement in prisons.

and so much more!

Can't wait that long to get involved? Here are some advocacy opportunities in the first week of March:

Participate in the [RI Poor People's Campaign](#) rally at the State House on **Saturday, March 2, 2024**. You can either meet Dave Larson and others at Gloria Dei church across from the Providence Place Mall between 10:00 and 10:45 and march to the State House, or you can just meet the march at the State House - City side - around 11:00. You will meet fellow advocates, get some fresh air, hear some inspiring speakers, and get up close and personal with our beautiful State House.

Provide written testimony (email works great!) **by March 6th**, or testify in person **on March 7th** in support of [House Bill 7400](#) which would establish new programs for free breakfast and lunch meals in all public schools. **Representative Alex Marszalkowski is the rep for many of us here in Cumberland, and he is on the House Finance Committee where this testimony will be heard.** We could use some personal stories of how poverty affects learning and the importance of free school meals.

Express your faith through advocacy! There are so many ways you can contribute - from simply sending emails to reps/senators and legislative leaders to showing up at the State House for rallies and hearings. Trustee Committee Update

The Trustee Committee met on Thursday, February 8, 2024 at 6:00 P.M.

The meeting started with the annual review of the church's portfolio of investments managed by Rockland Trust. Our guests from Rockland were Mary Friel and Paula Murphy. It was reported that the investments follow the guidelines of the UMC policy and that no changes were recommended at this time. Despite large withdrawals in 2023 for capital expenses, the funds have continued to grow. Looking toward possible sustainability projects in 2024, it was decided to keep some of the funds liquid and add to that amount as bonds matured.

In other news, the following reports were made:

- Tom Cabana has purchased the paint so that Ross Hancock may start giving the pews in the sanctuary a fresh coat of paint.
- A new donation, earmarked for the sustainability project, has been received and was gratefully appreciated. Dave Larson's committee is in the process of gathering quotes for the insulation work to be done.
- Replacing the children's swing set was put back on the "springtime is coming" agenda.
- Whether or not to sealcoat the new parking lot pavement was tabled until all trustees were present.
- Tree and electrical projects at the parsonage have been completed. But, now the lamppost is no longer working. Stanley Tree Service and Eastland Electric will be consulted.
- The basement sump pump in the parsonage was replaced by Sam Baker and George Gettinger. A new shop vac and plastic shelves were bought by the trustees for future rainstorms.
- The "AMUMC Wedding Packet" was reviewed and the language updated.
- The possibility of allowing the Town of Cumberland to use Cargill Hall as a polling location in September and November was discussed but opinions were mixed. It was decided to send the information to all trustees and take a vote by email.
- Mark Farnell reported that AMUMC received a \$1065 donation from the Arnold Mills Cemetery Association.
- The AMUMC TRUSTEE MANUAL was distributed to all members. Please see Lindsay Gettinger for a copy if you are interested in knowing just what this committee handles and all the professional resources used.
- Items for attention are still a bike rack, handrail evaluations, and a pew wheelchair cutout in the sanctuary.
- Thanks were expressed to Tom Hetherington for substituting as our secretary.
- The next meeting will be held on March 14, 2024 at 6:30 P.M.

Why am I here? - LeeAnn Cotta

Why am I here? You have been hearing this question answered over the past few weeks. My initial reason is not all that different from what others have said. When I was looking for a church to bring my young family to, over thirty years ago, I first went to a Congregational church because that was the denomination I was brought up in. I visited the local church several times over the course of a year and never once felt as though I found the place that I wanted to be a part of. Why? Because I never felt welcomed. It was my mom who suggested I try visiting other churches in the area, even if it was not a congregational church. My first thought was that 'pretty Methodist church' on Nate Whipple Highway. It reminded me of the church I grew up in. Every interaction I had with the people of AMUMC was warm, friendly, and welcoming, beginning with my initial phone call to the church secretary, to the lovely women in the toddler room, to the usher who made sure to seat me with a friendly couple, and most importantly to the wonderful congregation who made my daughter and I feel welcomed and included when we walked through the doors of Cargill Hall. I had found my church.

So why am I still here? The answer simply is, that we are still that wonderful church we were 30 years ago. So why do I feel it is so important that we be a reconciling church? I want every person who enters the doors of our amazing church to feel the way I did so many years ago. In my role as Christian Education Chair, and as a church school teacher, I have had the opportunity to meet most of the wonderful families that have come looking for a church of their own. One of the most memorable interactions I had was with the mom of a new student. When she came to pick up her child, she asked me if her child told me that she has two moms. I said, "No she didn't." She then immediately followed up with, "Will that be a problem?" I then responded with a resounding "No, not at all!" It was in that moment that I realized that no matter how warm and friendly we are when new people walk through our doors, they really don't know "how welcome" they are. It made me sad that this wonderful mom had to ask if she and her child would be welcome at this church because someone may not be comfortable with what may be thought of as their unconventional family. It was really at this moment that I thought, wow, we really need to do more so the LGBTQ+ community knows before they walk through our doors, that they are truly welcome in every sense of the word.

School Supply Donation Program

The response to the donations of teaching supplies has been very generous – so far! Thank you!

We have created a chart of the 15 elementary schools in Cumberland, Lincoln and Woonsocket. We will expand the offerings for specific schools requested by, or affiliated with, AMUMC members. **We plan to make donations to all of those schools** in a systematic manner. So far, **we have made donations to four schools and thank you cards are posted on the bulletin board in the coat room.** We look forward to ongoing donations that we can distribute to the remaining schools. This is especially important because the teaching staff in many schools provide various supplies for their classrooms that are not covered in the school budgets. Those out-of-pocket purchases benefit their students. A basket is in the hallway next to the display case and the other donation baskets.

We will be hosting coffee

hour on Palm Sunday and available throughout as well. Pastor Heather can be found at Phantom Farms on Wednesday mornings to discuss any and all topics more intimately including what it means to be a Reconciling Church. **GUEST PREACHER:** We are very excited to host Reverend Mary Johnson, the wife of Bishop Johnson on Sunday April 7th! This is an honor for the Amazing Arnold Mills and one to look forward to. **SHARING:** We have committee members sharing their WHY for joining AMUMC during church services as well as in the newsletter. **TEMPERATURE TAKING:** We will be sending out a short survey to help us know how the congregation feels about the Reconciliation process as well as have pins throughout the church for people to take to show their support. We will hold a formal vote around the end of May of church members and if we get a 75% affirmation from the church body, we will add ourselves to the growing list of Reconciling Congregations! 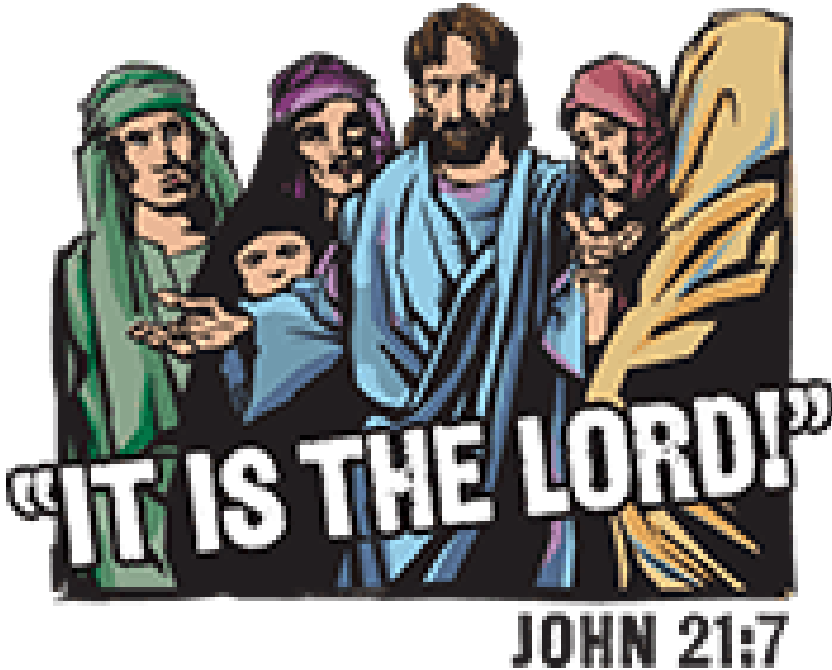

*Meet the resurrected Jesus in their own lives.

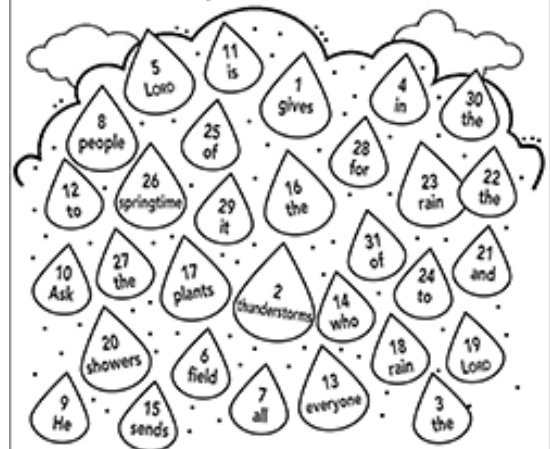
Recognize the presence of Jesus Christ in their everyday lives.

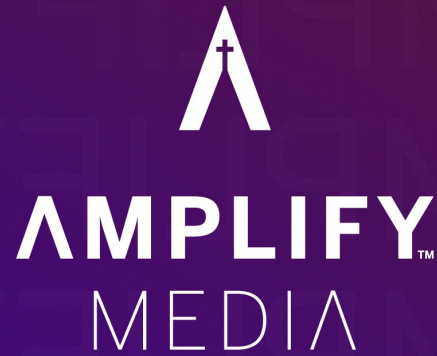

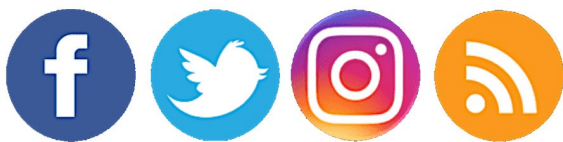
