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A note from our pastor...

Beautiful Beloveds,

Any Anne Lamott fans out there? In her book, *Help, Thanks, Wow,* she writes one of my all time favorite descriptions of Autumn. "And autumn ain't so shabby for wow, either. The colors are broccoli and flame and fox fur. The tang is apples, death, and wood smoke. The rot smells faintly of grapes, of fermentation, of one element being changed alchemically into another, and the air is moist and you sleep under two down comforters in a cold room. The trails are not dusty anymore, and you get to wear your favorite sweaters." She invites me to stop what I'm doing, become aware of all five senses, and give thanks.

As we move into November, we'll see signs and social media posts reminding us to give thanks. Our inner cynic may mutter something about only being grateful in November, but it's a start. Daily practices of gratitude can change us: lowering anxiety, helping us sleep better, and drawing us closer to God and one another. Henri Nouwen reminds us, "Gratitude as a discipline involves a conscious choice. I can choose to be grateful even when my emotions and feelings are still steeped in hurt and resentment."

This month, how will you choose gratitude? Countless coaches will tell you habits take a long time to become part of us, at least 21 days. And habits shared with others, last longer. So join us in month long practice of gratitude. Join us in worship, as we give thanks for the saints of our lives, the people of our community, the word of God, our church, and everyday blessings. Join our Wednesday night study on zoom as we together, we study and practice gratitude. Attend our church conference, November 21, as we give thanks for the missions and ministries of our church. Check out our social media posts: Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter where we'll be sharing daily (or almost daily) posts about gratitude. Share your own posts of gratitude and thanksgiving. Post pictures of people, places and things for which you are grateful. Let's fill our feed with thanks! This month, let's give up doomscrolling and instead give thanks.

CLIMATE CARE - SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAICS / HEAT PUMP COMMITTEE

Arnold Mills is moving forward with some steps to reduce the church's greenhouse gas footprint, our contribution to climate change. Over the next two months we plan to: seek and gain additional input from the congregation on possible investments, finalize investment(s) selected, get quotes on installation, gain final approval from the Trustees and Church Council, and conduct fundraising/ financing prior to inking deal(s) and completing the work. Please watch for and respond to an email survey in November, and also attend one of the listening sessions we will have at coffee hours in November. Here is a "nickel tour" of the investments being considered:

- Additional **insulation and lighting retrofits** low cost measures to save on utilities Installation of **solar photovoltaic panels to generate electricity**. With incentives available, this is a moderate investment with excellent financial benefits to the church and outward display of our commitment to creation care.
- Installation of **heat pumps to provide heating and cooling** in the sanctuary and/or Cargill Hall, and perhaps other parts of the church. Incentives have increased recently, but this still can be a significant investment. Utility costs would remain about the same (electricity is more expensive than gas), but this measure offers the largest reduction to our greenhouse gas footprint.

October 2023 Trustee Meeting

The Trustee Committee met on October 12, 2023. We have completed or are working on the following projects:

- The Sustainability Project is awaiting the report from RISE and then will be moving forward with consultations on solar energy sources and heat pumps.

- One of the condensate pumps on the boiler system has failed. Pending approval from the Council, it will be replaced at a cost of \$3,242 by T.H. Malloy and Sons.

- The dehumidifier in lower Cargill Hall has been turned off and stored for the winter months.

- Hartford Steam Boiler Company has inspected the boiler and declared it to be in good working order.

- Fire Extinguisher and Handicapped Parking Signs were recently received and are in the process of being mounted.

- A new handle with a working lock has been installed on one of the bathroom doors by A Better Locksmith.

- The battery in the Verizon phone box was replaced.

- AA requested the use of Cargill Hall on Tuesday nights. Unfortunately, we are not able to accommodate them on that night as the scouts meet then. Alternative nights were offered, but declined.

- A Diwali Festival was scheduled for Saturday night, November 4th, in Cargill Hall. This was to include ground fireworks so the Fire Department was contacted for approval. As of this writing, this Festival of Lights may have to be moved to a bigger venue as the number of attendees has grown to 175!

- The trustee representative to the Safety and Security Committee presented the "Fire Alarm Response and Building Evacuation Protocol". Trustees will be working on clearing all stairways and exit areas, adding exit signs, and cleaning out "stuff" from under stairways and the basement storage areas. All electrical control boxes throughout the building must be easily accessible.

- Replacing the children's swing set is being looked into with memorial gifts to be the source for funding.

- Orchard Acres has been employed again this winter to shovel and salt our walkways.

- Atlantic Elevator will be contacted to service the elevator.

- A new project which may be undertaken is assembling "Flood Buckets" to be given to neighbors in need. Stay tuned.

- The lighting, or lack of lighting, in the small parking lot has become an issue. Eastland Electric will be there on November 3rd to aim and/or replace the floodlights. They will also be evaluating the wiring and number of outlets in the

sanctuary, and adding three-prong, grounded outlets in the basement and stage area.

- A new smoke/CO alarm has been purchased for the parsonage.
- Eventually the juice stains and the wax will be removed from the sanctuary carpet.

- The trustees will meet next on November 16th at 6:30 PM. There will not be a December meeting. Respectfully submitted,

The Franklin Farm Community Garden and the Historic Metcalf-Franklin Farm Preservation Association

The volunteers at Franklin Farm have completed the 2023 harvest season! Over 35,000 pounds of summer and winter squash, cucumbers, zucchini, eggplant, tomatoes and additional vegetables were donated to the RI Community Food Bank, the Northern RI Food Pantry, the Salvation Army of Pawtucket, the Pawtucket Soup Kitchen, the Connecting for Children and Families Food Pantry in Woonsocket, the Pregreso Latino in Central Falls and the New Beginnings Kitchen also in Woonsocket. The current project is to erect **two** duplexes at **83 & 85 Oakland School Street in Burrillville, RI.** The first duplex has been approved for occupancy! The second duplex foundation was installed and in the next few weeks volunteer groups can be assigned the various construction tasks. We will notify AMUMC volunteers when we can return to the work site as we

have done previously.

Cintas Clothing Donation and the St. James Episcopal Church Clothing Closet

The twice monthly clothing donations continue from the Cintas Warehouse in Woonsocket to the St. James Church clothing closet. The delivery schedule is posted in the coat room. Our volunteer coordinators provide the largest clothing donations to the St. James Clothing Closet! **The Clothing Closet is requesting dona-tions of children's clothing.** Those items can be placed in the hallway at our church and they will be delivered to St. James Church by our volunteers.

Dave's Marketplace Day Old Bakery Donations

Since 2016, volunteers from AMUMC have transported day old baked goods three times each week to the Cumberland Senior Center, the Northern RI Food Pantry or the Woonsocket Shelter. The schedule of the three donations each week and the many volunteers making the deliveries is posted on the bulletin board in the coat room.

The Woonsocket Shelter

The Woonsocket Shelter has received donations of persons care items and household items (sheets, towels, quilts, curtains, etc.) for families to relocate into independent living when they leave the shelter. In addition, AMUMC volunteers have been donating day old baked goods from area supermarkets – currently Dave's Marketplace – for over 15 years to the shelter. On Fridays, Elton and Rachel Odom make the weekly deliveries to the Shelter.

Tips for November 2023

Keep your garden messy all winter—for the birds! <u>Help them feed</u> through the winter by not deadheading spent blooms and not cleaning up your garden. Enjoy watching the birds. Point them out to children and even critical neighbors and remind them we are caretakers of all of God's creation.

Are you aware of <u>eco-grief</u>? That sense of loss of control in response to visible devastation—from draught, flooding, superstorms, wildfires, and heat waves—can be debilitating, especially among young people who also fear the loss of a good future. Help by listening, finding actions to do together, and looking for signs of hope. **Trust the Creator and resolve to be among the hands, feet, and voices needed** to move us all to a better place.

Changing seasons bring on the desire for changing wardrobes. Before you race off to online or local clothing stores, **listen to Joshua Becker for practical ways to enjoy clothing** without falling into the traps of consumerism. Shop with a friend or family member who has also seen the 4-minute video.

With the gain in wind, solar, and other renewables, the evidence is clear that stopping the fossil fuel industry is both possible and essential. Along with your individual actions, **advocate for systems change**. Add your voice to the public pressure and momentum needed now. Don't delay.

Choose aluminum cans over plastic bottles. Plastic can be successfully recycled just once or twice, and only 3–6% of plastic that makes it to the recycling bin is truly recycled. On the other hand, <u>aluminum</u> can be recycled infinitely—as long as you put the can into the recycle bin.

If it's your practice to take a hostess gift to a party or special dinner, **choose earth-friendly gifts** that keep giving, for example: a shampoo bar, a package of wooden clothes pins to use instead of plastic "chip clips," jams or other preserves from local farmers, a roll of bamboo toilet paper from <u>Who Gives a Crap</u>. Sustainable presents say thank you and spark good conversation.

Enjoy your Thanksgiving celebrations, **starting with a sustainability mindset**: reusable dinnerware, cloth napkins, less meat/more plant-based foods, a plan to use leftovers, a kitchen set up to maximize compostables and minimize trash, even washable rags for cleanup instead of wasting trees with paper towels. Earth will be thankful you did.


During the holiday season you may have **extra food on hand**. When people buy more than they can use, the result is food waste, which contributes to methane gas if not composted. **Try these strategies:** Put perishable food in a fridge drawer designated as "Eat Me First." Freeze food before it needs to be trashed. Make great soups or smoothies. Share within your family and community.

Just after we have said thanks for all we have, Black Friday, Cyber Monday, and the blitz of holiday media tell us to buy more! **Be thoughtful about how much you really need.** Then check out <u>Green America's Directory of Sustainable Gifts, Holidays, and Special Events</u> before you shop.

Fall and winter are the seasons for planting trees. Explore your options for your home, your community, for your "neighbors" around the world whose lands need <u>reforestation</u>. **Consider planting trees as a gift op-tion**—a memorial or in honor of someone you love—and as a sign of hope. Read Job 14:7-9.


