Beautiful Beloveds,

Each and every season have their own special sensory wonders. For me, September kicks off fall with the sounds of a marching band, the smell of a freshly sharpened Dixon Ticonderoga #2 yellow pencil, the warmth of a favorite sweatshirt on the first cool evenings, a wood fire, and the crisp taste of a perfectly ripe apple, just off the tree. Church in September is its own sensory experience: the choir warming up as coffee perks, smiles as familiar faces come around the corner, the joyful exuberance of children, and the sound of a sanctuary full of people singing a song they love. It's another new year in the life of the church, and we start it with joy, love and wonder.

Feeding Our Faith: The Celebration of Eucharist.

Join us on Zoom as watch and discuss, Feeding Our Faith: The Celebration of Eucharist. Eucharist, literally "good grace," is what some churches call communion. ... There have been many interpretations about what actually happens when Christians receive communion, whether the elements become the "actual" body and blood of Christ or whether the event is only a remembrance of the first communion. ...

In this series, we discuss what communion means in the lives of theologians, authors, and food pantry workers. We will see how the Eucharist goes far beyond the limited "theologies" that people debate about, and how we can only find meaning through an experience of it. In this way, what happens to us in the Eucharist is the more important than what we believe about it. What does it mean to be in the embrace of God and others? How can we embrace this in the bread and the wine?

### **August Trustee Report**

The Trustee Committee met on Thursday, July 13th, at 6:30 PM. The most important items we covered are as follows:

- Our Rockland Trust portfolio is up \$39,516, even after withdrawals for ongoing projects.
- Dave is researching the availability of funds from Interfaith Power and Light to help with paying for our sustainability project of heat pumps and insulation. RISE Energy will be conducting an audit on July 31st.
- An estimate from Lizotte Glass Company for installing glass panels in the office and vestry doors was approved.
- Ocean State Air has sent a corrected statement for servicing the dehumidifier and air conditioning units.
- The second stage of the organ repair has been put on hold.
- Instead of fixing up the playground equipment, the cost of a new unit is being investigated.
- J. Perry Paving has been given a 50% down payment for the repaving, seal-coating, and line-striping project. The small parking lot is scheduled to be done on July 31 and August 1. Hopefully, the large parking lot and driveway work will be completed afterwards. That will depend upon the weather!
- Cargill Hall will be rented on November 4th to a group celebrating Diwali, the Festival of Lights.
- Cargill Hall has been looked at as a possible polling place for the September primary and November elections. We have not heard back from the Town of Cumberland as to whether this will be the case.
- Possible uses of the church's lot next to the fire station were discussed. This discussion will be continued.
- Tom Cabana will be the trustee representative to the Building Security Committee, now forming.
- The White Memorial Family Reunion in Cargill Hall on July 15th was a great event, according to family members. They left the place spotless and will always be welcomed back!
- Stanley Tree Service will be contacted to trim the trees along the driveway and a few other areas.
- The paving, seal-coating and lining of the parking lots and driveway has been completed. We are very pleased with the physical outcome as well as the experience of working with the employees and owners of J. Perry Paving. From start to finish, every person was polite, knowledgeable, prompt, and ready to go above and beyond to please us. Please promote this company if you have a chance!
- To add to the beauty and safety of the church grounds, Stanley Tree Service has trimmed along the driveway and manicured trees on both lawns.
- Handicapped Parking Signs will be installed once new ones are bought. The dumpster will be relocated once an area is cleared for it.

#### **Habitat for Humanity**

The current project is to erect **two** duplexes at **83 & 85 Oakland School Street in Burrillville**, **RI**. The first duplex is still waiting for permits to be issued for occupation. The second duplex foundation will be installed in the next few weeks and then the volunteer groups can be assigned the various construction tasks. **We will notify AMUMC volunteers when we can return to the work site as we have done previously.** 

#### Cintas Clothing Donation and the St. James Episcopal Church Clothing Closet

The twice monthly clothing donations continue from the Cintas Warehouse in Woonsocket to the St. James Church clothing closet. The delivery schedule is posted in the coat room. Our volunteer coordinators provide the largest clothing donations to the St. James Clothing Closet!

#### **Dave's Marketplace Day Old Bakery Donations**

Since 2016, volunteers from AMUMC have transported day old baked goods three times each week to the Cumberland Senior Center, the Northern RI Food Pantry or the Woonsocket Shelter. The schedule of the three donations each week and the many volunteers making the deliveries is posted on the bulletin board in the coat room.

#### The Woonsocket Shelter

The Woonsocket Shelter has received donations of persons care items and household items (sheets, towels, quilts, curtains, etc.) for families to relocate into independent living when they leave the shelter. In addition, AMUMC volunteers have been donating day old baked goods from area supermarkets – currently Dave's Marketplace – for over 15 years to the shelter. On Fridays, Elton and Rachel Odom make the weekly deliveries to the Shelter.

## Tips for September 2023

Use the worship materials for the <u>Season of Creation</u> (September 3–October 1) as a way of teaching all generations, especially the children through the "Children's Ministry Ideas" for each of the Sundays. Continue to find ways in **worship in all seasons to assert that creation care is God's calling to all.** 

Be sure to walk the talk. What are children and youth learning from the church's practices? Are recycling bins visible? Are meals served on washable dinnerware—not plastic or Styrofoam? Is food waste composted? Is there a bike rack providing an alternative to driving? Young ones are watching.

**Does the church have a vegetable garden?** Invite young people to help with the planting, tending, and harvesting. Point out the wonders of growing things, as well as the justice of sharing with those in need. Check out <a href="Harmony Creation Care Curriculum">Harmony Creation Care Curriculum</a>, by United Methodist <a href="EarthKeepers">EarthKeepers</a>, Rev. Crystal Paul-Watson and her mom, Lavanda Paul.

**Does the church have a pollinator garden?** Check on it regularly as an "I-spy" adventure or an art activity. Do the children see the bees and butterflies? The array of bright colors? Talk about the importance of even a tiny insect for creating food and delight. Talk about how the church is committed to taking care of God's creatures. Share the books, *The Thing About Bees: A Love Letter* or *Honey Bee*.

As the church plans mission trips, field trips, or retreats, think through the opportunities to practice sustainability, including asking everyone to bring refillable water bottles, providing ways for the group to minimize or compost food waste and reduce the use of paper products, and choosing a closer location and a method of transport that will reduce emissions. Encourage participants to be mindful of their impact.

School is starting. If you have pick-up duty, **keep the car engine off while you wait.** Emissions from idling cars spew unseen particulates into the air, which research has shown negatively affects the cognitive performance of children. Get out of your car, enjoy the weather, and meet other parents, grands, and nannies. Tell them—and your children—why you don't let the engine run.

**Investigate what is happening to unused food from the school.** Some schools have a "share table," allowing the children to leave fruit, milk, and any other packaged food they choose not to eat so that it can be refrigerated and shared with a community feeding program. This practice helps with hunger, teaches caring for others, and reduces food waste, which is 40% of most landfills. When children learn this mindset, they bring it home too.


Join other parents to advocate for opportunities for students to experience nature firsthand, including school gardens and field trips for a deeper immersion into the natural world. Invite your child to talk about the adventure and name it as part of the wonder of God's gift and call to us to be good stewards.

**For the sake of a better future, tackle a big project**, such as advocating for the school bus fleet to be electrified, the roof of the school—or church—to host solar panels, or multiple trees to be added to the campus. Big projects take time and commitment, but they have big dividends for the future and bring multiple opportunities to talk about caring for creation.

Rake leaves this fall as a family, as a group of friends, or as a church youth group helping someone. Look for ways to **turn the leaves into mulch** so they continue to feed the soil, rather than bagging them and sending them to the landfill. Talk about the process God supplies for continuing to nourish the land, which in turn nourishes all of life.

The United Methodist Creation Justice Movement is providing these Tips as a tool to equip church members, families, and individuals to respond to God's call to care for creation and do justice with our neighbors. For more about the UM
